

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Trentham Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)

Trentham CERT Turns One!

The Trentham Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) has just celebrated its first anniversary. CERT teams operate in various locations around our state particularly in rural areas. The Teams are purely volunteer staffed and are trained and supported by Ambulance Victoria.

Our Trentham Team largely owes its formation to the campaigning of local legend Ethan Brown who exemplifies the Trentham community spirit we all know and love.

Trentham CERT could not have been formed at a more challenging time for Ambulance Victoria with the onset

of COVID 19 and the first lockdown coming shortly after the group completed their initial training. In fact, the Trentham CERT's official opening was postponed due to the pandemic and 12 months on and over 100 local people assisted, the CERT is well and truly in action but didn't quite make it to an official opening.

People who stand up in the face of this pandemic are to be commended, but those who do so on a volunteer basis are to be admired, true heroes of the community. Our CERT members dedicate their own time to practising their skills and making themselves available to respond purely for the care of the community they live in. Ambulance Victoria asks for a commitment of 20 hours per month to be available to respond but many of our volunteers commit to plenty more hours than that.

Currently we have 9 members in the Trentham Team and an additional two more who are currently in training. Ambulance Victoria is always happy to consider new applicants so if it sounds like something you might be interested in let us know. More on that below!

There are many reasons why it is nice to always have an emergency medical response team nearby, but the most urgent of all calls is for a cardiac arrest. Ambulance Victoria has Paramedic Branches that surround Trentham at Daylesford, Kyneton and Woodend. Each of these has a response time to Trentham of around 15 minutes if travelling under emergency conditions, weather permitting. Consider that for every minute effective CPR is not performed on an arrested patient, their chances of survival reduce by 10% and it doesn't take a Rhodes Scholar to work out that we need people, within our community, who are competent in this skill.

Our CERT members receive training in CPR and in many other things that can assist in saving lives or making patients more comfortable until an ambulance is available to transport the patient to hospital.

If you are interested in becoming a CERT member or have a first aid competency there is a couple of different ways to help the local community. Firstly, to become a CERT



member contact Ambulance Victoria or chat to one of our local members and provide your contact details. The second way you can help is by becoming a GoodSam responder. GoodSam is an App you can download to your smartphone, if you are a first aid qualified adult you can join and help us to save lives.

She expressed her delight at seeing the Shed now open, supporting men's health in this community. Her tour included both the kitchen and toilets, these being funded by a Strengthening Communities grant from her electoral office. Needless to say, she enjoyed a cuppa with a group of locals, chatting about Trentham life, as well as a walk through of what the Shed offers.

Some men like doing things, others prefer conversation. So, the Shed has two areas: a workshop with equipment for woodwork and metalwork, and a social area with a mix of tables and seating, kitchen, heating / cooling and library - and a big television with DVD player. Some community groups are now using this well-insulated room.

New opening hours

The Shed has been open on Saturday mornings since early December, after the easing of COVID regulations. A survey of members has seen this change to Wednesdays, 9.30am – 1pm. Visitors are welcome to come and have a look then, and see what the Shed offers.

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Councillor's Report

Child Care – After much hard work and anxious delays the Trentham Early Learning Centre recently opened, providing childcare services in conjunction with the highly successful kindergarten. It took months to employ suitably skilled staff but the perseverance and diligence of Council staff Fran Fogarty and Kate Procter enabled this much-needed facility to open. Thank-you Fran and Kate. In further good news the centre has now secured a federal government grant which means families will be eligible for means-tested subsidised childcare. The centre will also be open for an additional third day in Term Two. Families are encouraged to support and utilise the centre, as this will enable the range of services and hours to be further expanded.

Community Centre – It is expected that Council will be briefed on the revised concept plans in early April. The plans, which incorporate feedback from the community survey, will then be presented to the community. Any changes arising from that process will finalise the plans. Work is already underway to secure grant funding.

Consultation – A new community engagement policy was adopted at a special Council meeting on 23 February. The policy reflects input from the community via online survey and numerous pop-up sessions. The policy determines how Council will engage with the community on any project or initiative based on a matrix accounting for the budget, impact, complexity, strategic importance, risk, influence and community sentiment.

Customer service – A Council customer service desk has been created in the Trentham Library, allowing for a wide range of services to be transacted locally. This brings Coliban ward up to par with other wards in Hepburn Shire.

Finance – Council recently reviewed its financial outlook and budget. As a consequence a number of capital works projects across the shire have been deferred and will be reconsidered as future year's budgets are prepared. Some other projects have been cancelled entirely. None are in Coliban ward. In many cases the projects had been created some years ago and in all cases had not been commenced. This review was necessary in light of cashflow forecasts and given the size of the backlog of projects.

Planning scheme – A Special Council Meeting on 29 March adopted amendments to the Planning Scheme as

recommended by the independent Planning Panels Victoria. The amended Planning Scheme will then be submitted to the Minister for Planning for approval. This review has been a significant and complex piece of work, long overdue. However more planning work is necessary and will be undertaken as a priority over the next two years. Following the 29 March meeting, sessions will be held to explain the changes and outline the scope of ongoing work.

Quarry St Reserve – Council is upgrading toilet facilities in seven locations across the shire – including Quarry St Reserve. Council will also renovate the pavilion.

Roads – I am in the process of making submissions to the 2021/22 budget for roadworks in Blue Mount, Gleeson, Racecourse, Lagoon and Horvaths Roads and Cranneys Lane. I am also seeking footpath works in High St near Cosmo Rd and the Town Square.

Strategic planning – Significant work has been undertaken in the past month to develop a vision for the shire, in partnership with the community, and to develop sustainable and achievable long-term plans. Over 1,250 people have given input or made submissions – a very encouraging participation rate.

At the completion of a recent presentation and discussion with grade-four primary school students on the role of Councils I posed the question to students – what is important to them and what do they value most in living in and around Trentham? It was instructive and encouraging to hear the ten-year olds emphasise, in their own words, the natural environment, sense of community and desire to preserve the unique and characterful feel of our townships. We would do well to heed those words of wisdom.

Ward meeting – I intend to hold a ward meeting now COVID regulations allow. A wide range of matters will be discussed, and I will be seeking direction from the community on submissions for the 21/22 budget and beyond.

New Committee of Management

The AGM was held on 4 March - the main agenda item was nominating a new Committee of Management for the next three year term. DELWP has to ratify the Committee, which will officially start their term on 10 April.

Four of the five previous committee members are continuing - Fay Magee, Charles Sherlock, John Riches and Helen van der Werff. Three new members have joined - Chris Caudle, Pam Cornthwaite and Steve Kelly.


David McCallum resigned from the Committee after several years in the role of Chair. David's contribution has been significant and the changes to the Reserve in recent years are a testament to his passion and hard work.

Draft Plan for Pavilion Upgrade

Further to the presentation and initial consultation at the Community Meeting held in late February, a draft plan for the upgrade of the Pavilion has been developed. The full set of drawings are available on our website and FB page. The Council team working on this project has confirmed



that the Toilet Block will be upgraded, not demolished and replaced. The Committee is keen to get community feedback on this plan, which has NOT yet been approved by Council. You can message us via our FB page or email helen@helenmac.com with your comments.



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It doesn't seem that long ago we were in the grip of extremely high temperatures that brought with them widespread drought and bushfires.

That was over a year ago, but according to the Bureau of Meteorology the extreme weather patterns have now generally returned to overall longer-term averages. And that's a welcome development - thanks in good part to the strong La Niña weather. The Bureau just recently reported that Victoria's 2020 was the mildest year for daytime temperatures in just under a decade.

Here in Trentham that is welcome news and the damper conditions meant that fire danger rationing was generally suppressed. And those favourable conditions were reflected in the number of emergency calls our volunteers responded to. Between December 1 and March 14, we responded to 17 calls, which you would describe as being a lower-than-average Summer. Those call outs ranged from grass fires - the most notable being at Kyneton in mid-January - to smouldering trees and burn-offs. The most unusual attendance was a car fire which was believed to have been caused when a battery was removed and ignited a small amount of fuel.

It is important to keep in mind that the fire danger period remains in force. So, until the restrictions are lifted residents should refrain from lighting fires to burn-off until officially notified. [editorial note: Restrictions for Hepburn Shire are set to be lifted on 6 April, please confirm through official channels closer to that date.]

Meantime, the number of Trentham Brigade volunteers continues to grow. But we are always looking for new members to bolster the ranks. Training has been stepped up since the relaxation of face-to-face COVID 19 limitations, with new members instructed in general firefighting skills. These sessions are conducted online and in classroom and practical settings and are essential training. At the same time, our experienced firefighters are also undergoing further training, updating, and enhancing their existing skills. In the cooler months ahead the training and drills will continue - to prepare us for the impending Summer.

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Trentham Library

Currently, Trentham Library has 650 active members on its books, and I am reliably informed that visitations are now almost back to the pre-COVID high of 1200 a month. Undoubtedly, this is largly due to the professionalism and enthusiasm of the library staff over the past almost nine years, since the current building opened in early July 2012.

By 2009/10, library service in Trentham was in a parlous state. An aging mobile library would arrive and park in the mud opposite The Coliban Foodstore in Market Street on a Tuesday afternoon for an hour or so. On regular occasions the prime mover would breakdown, and the long-suffering library officer/ driver would be forced to appear, with as many books as possible in her own vehicle. Council had no plans to upgrade or replace.


In early 2010, the author was strolling down Albert Street and spied the recently vacated, and then largely underutilised Community Health Centre, constructed in 1985, and thought it would make an excellent Library. David Lenehan, CEO of Hepburn Health at the time, not only answered his own phone but came on board in a matter of minutes.

What followed, led to arguably the most significant community effort in Trentham of the past decade. Newly energised, I approached the local Councillor, Sebastian Klein, and a then extremely active Trentham Forum, and with their support put the case to Hepburn Shire Council. The result was an allocation of \$50,000... for a survey to assess the need for such a service in Trentham.

Time to bring in the heavy artillery! Jill McCallum, recently retired Eastern Regional Libraries Children's Librarian, made it clear that they had already done the surveys, and for good measure, wrote an application for a State Grant for another \$55,000, which Hepburn Shire subsequently gained.

Sensing that Hepburn Shire's expertise was limited to surveys, a local Forum Working Group was formed with Jill and David as co-Chairs. The 14 member Working Group included a wide range of skills and experience. Amongst our numbers were those with design skills, considerable library experience, project management experience, and key contacts in the library world.

For my sins, I became in effect an unofficial Clerk of Works; a dream job, as volunteers and tradies working at mate's rates, all put in, to the best of their ability, to make sure that the July 3 opening date was met. An added bonus was

that even after the library was furnished and fully stocked there were enough funds to carry out landscaping. A local landscaper came up with a plan, and local volunteers put it into operation

Jill's foresight in purchasing bookshelves on wheels was apparent quite recently when a rearrangement of shelving was needed upon the installation of a local Council service desk for Trentham, an initiative which was first put forward by the Working Group nine years ago.

Over the intervening years, Council has thankfully extended the hours of opening considerably.

News Update

Tour of Water Storage & Treatment Plant.

A fascinating and informative tour of Trentham's Water Storage & Treatment Plant took place on Saturday 27 February, when experts from Coliban Water met with local people on-site at Lagoon Road. The tour arose from TSG's interest in water security and followed an interesting and insightful on-line presentation by Coliban Water managers in November last year.

The tour showed the uniqueness of Trentham's water system (which is spring-fed supplemented by a license for groundwater) and the complex multi-stage filtration and treatment of water which enables a clean and reliable water supply for our town. In the final stage, all our water passes through micro-filtration tubes narrow enough to take out nearly all microscopic entities.

One interesting fact we learned was that the flow rate is increased by more than 40% on Friday afternoons to cope with the weekend influx of visitors and part-time residents.

Eating Your Garden

Greens

While we'd hoped to be writing about our wonderful crop of corn, a continued cool and wet start to Autumn may well place corn in the 'try again next year' bucket.

But – what is loving the current climate? Greens! Rocket is lush, sorel is rampant, spinach is flourishing, celery is picture perfect and kale is next level. Even the unfortunate, way-too-bitter witlof mistake looks like it belongs on the cover of a magazine! The recent rain has made greens incredibly prolific, and cooler temps have stopped them bolting to seed. We've (almost) moved on from the crisp and gentle salad leaves of summer (miss you already, oak leaf lettuce!) and onto those with more body.

- Kale can be polarising (we are firmly in the for camp here!). Use it in place of cabbage in a coleslaw, pick the baby leaves and add to a salad, sauté with garlic and a little lemon zest, or roast into kale chips. What's not to love about this versatile veg?
- For those in the anti-kale camp don't just think of it as a veg, it's colour and texture also lends it to being a

- fabulous ornamental plant. From the wonderful purple of frilly leafed scarlet kale to the striking slate coloured Tuscan kale, it's frost hardy, so worth considering!
- Rocket (Roquette, Arugula) pairs with almost everything. As we look towards salads with heavier ingredients (think roasted veg) rocket provides the perfect base as it can stand up to warm ingredients without turning yucky when it wilts. Add some soft cheese of your choice (feta is fab, stilton a treat) and toasted nuts and you are good to go.
- Little seedlings are popping up everywhere which make for fabulous baby and micro greens. Super tender and delicious, but also a fabulous garnish to any dish.
- Grab some baby leaves from beetroots to add to salads for colour
- Pesto! Don't limit yourself to basil. Blitz, pound, chop –
 whatever you have time and energy for- these hardier
 greens into pesto to both use now and store (including
 your celery leaves!)

And for everyone who has already got broccoli seedlings in the ground for an early kick-start - wow, look at them go! Already it's more promising than the corn...

Daylesford Spa Country Railway

Ever dreamt of catching a train at the end of Market Street? That dream may take some time but the recent and long-awaited launch by the State Government of preserving our rail history has resulted in a blueprint for the future, a State-wide strategy for the rail heritage industry. As part of the current study into the Daylesford-Macedon rail trail there is a concurrent one into the extension of Daylesford Spa Country Railways operations from Bullarto back to Trentham.

The project, called "Crossing the Divide" would see heritage train services restored back to Trentham from Bullarto. With a range of exciting opportunities for engagement with local businesses and the community to create a unique attraction for regional Victoria.

Several exciting opportunities for the tourist and hospitality industries would become possibilities with Hepburn Shire Residents getting 50% discounted ticket prices. Imagine sitting in a dining car enjoying produce grown in the very pastures your train is passing through, an enviable and unique experience anywhere in the world.

Larger surplus stock sits waiting to be used, the project would involve restoration and rehabilitation of 9 kms of track, five timber bridges, existing rolling stock and the Trentham railway station yard itself.

The project would also look at relocating the Domino Trail to an upgraded road next to the railway and the construction of a platform in the forest between Lyonville and Trentham as a centre for five defined walking trails amongst others.

Proposed complementary projects could include the upgrading of signalling to accommodate larger stock such as restaurant cars and sleepers and the existing track between Bullarto and Daylesford.

All in all, a big project that could boost tourism in the Trentham district with less vehicle congestion. With support from the State Government and the Hepburn Shire Council, the wheels are in motion.

Interior Design

I have a cold bottom!

As boisterous children, my cousins and I would run into our grandparents' bedroom when we visited, chest diving onto their rolled up piezyna (Polish for duvet).

As Europeans, my grandparents had separate duvets, wrapped in white covers and full of feathers rolled at the end of their bed. The duvets seemed to reach the sky, and we were jumping into the fluffy clouds.

These were not the duvets that we have now. My grandparents made their own duvets in one large case, filled with feathers. Back then feathers were hard to come by, and I do not know where they got them from.

Contemporary duvets can be made of chicken, duck or goose feathers, or wool, or microfibre and polyester, usually sewn into channels or squares, keeping the air pockets warm.

In bedding and manchester stores, special merchandising duvets are made, extra full, to create the look of full and luxurious fluffy duvets. When I am styling homes, or in my store, I use two duvets in the one cover to create a full look. Often, I will put a super-king duvet inside a king-sized cover, or a king duvet inside a queen cover. This makes the bedding look fuller and more inviting.

I like to use a larger duvet wherever possible, coordinating my duvet linen with display pillows (known as shams).

Changing a duvet cover can be quite a challenge. From years of practice, my approach is to take hold of a corner of the cover in each hand, then I roll the cover back over



my arms so that the cover is inside out. I then take hold of the duvet insert and I reverse the duvet cover back over the duvet, fastening the buttons once the insert is in position. Some covers have special ties sewn into them to attach the corners of the insert to the inside of the cover.

I recently purchased a new super-king duvet cover, which generously hangs either side of the bed. The cover design lines up with the edges of the king-sized mattress. Now I can tell when my duvet has been rolled and pulled off me during the night: I see where the lines of the design have been re-located to when I wake up each morning with a cold bottom!

Just... a bat sitting on my shoulder stretching its wings.

Within the world of Craft one can find traditional groups of women who are making, weaving, sewing, and designing pieces that may be worn or used as practical or ornamental pieces for everyday life. In Guatemala it is the men who craft the intricately woven bags.

There are many who will argue that Craft and Fine Art are as inspiring as each other. Indeed, perhaps they are, however In Fine Art a painting may inspire, or arouse an emotional experience for the viewer.

In the London National Gallery there is a painting that creates a strong emotional response. Each year the floor in front of this painting is replaced because of the many people who come to see it. (I believe it is over one million) The painting "The Execution of Lady Jane Grey" by Paul Delaroche depicts the moment where Lady Jane Grey, blindfolded, is being assisted to lay her head upon the block for the executioner. Her outstretched hand reaches uncertainly down to find the block.

When I saw this heart-wrenching image, my emotional response was a feeling of deep sadness and despair, and a questioning of the stupidity of the thinking within those times. The sweet innocence of Jane and the distraught maids behind her, remained with me as I continued through the gallery. (I believe there is a painting by Paul Delaroche in The Ballarat Art Gallery)

Perhaps the difference between Art and Craft can be measured by the response of the viewer. A jacket by Dior, Chanel, or Prada can be admired for its exquisite craftmanship and design. But I wonder if such items could bring an emotional response, except perhaps the price tag. The conversation shall continue around the differences for eternity.

As the great lateral thinker Edward de Bono claims: "creativity involves breaking out of established patterns in order to look at things in a different way". This may be applied to Art, Craft, Music, Dance, Quantum Physics, Car Mechanics, or anything else in this wonderful life we lead. Next month I shall explore the world of the Fine Art Artist.

On learning to love where you are...

Having worked in gardens over the world, it's fascinating to me how there are subtly different traditions in each country.

I worked at 'Great Dixter' in England where gardening was truly a high art. I can remember being set to work for hours subtly weeding and editing the self-sown plants in a rock wall. The result looked very chaotic and natural but was meticulously maintained so that certain plants wouldn't overtake and spoil the effect. I can specifically remember being asked to leave a dandelion at random intervals approximately every 2-4 metres!

In Germany I worked at a garden called 'Hermannshof' (see pic on right) where such precise records were taken that it was possible to find out exactly how many minutes of work each square metre of garden took to maintain per year. The process was in some ways extremely scientific, but the result was undeniably breathtakingly beautiful.


Australian gardens are often about outdoor lifestyle... we love to eat and cook outside, play sport and enjoy relaxing with a tea, coffee or something stronger! Trentham gardens have a uniqueness too. The cooler temperatures and higher rainfall allow for plants with greater delicacy than would succeed in areas like Melbourne. Often, we are lucky enough to have big gardens where plants can romp away and really show what they can do. Local indigenous plants have their own uniqueness too and give lots of scope for creativity.

Less than the wink of an eye...

...but there is a limit below which the eye sees nothing due to the speed of impressions from outside. As a child I played with a 'stroboscope', a drum with splits through which you looked at pictures which moved within the spinning drum.

The strips of 'stills' turned into celluloid films, moved through 'magic lanterns', projected on screens. Hence 'movies'. The 'bars' between the 'splits' became fast spinning 'flickers', debarring eyes from seeing the gaps between the 'stills'.

Digitalisation breaks the area of a screen up into 'pixels', thousands of them, which are activated, one by one, at vast speed far below the limits of sight.

The eye, as all other senses, is a vital organ of perception, facilitating immediate presence to our world. Even though a 'medium', its specific 'transparency' is the wonder and function of every sense-organ. Senses are vital, not only for information, but for all aspects of life, protection, digestion, reproduction, physical and mental well-being.

A screen does deprive vision of a direct experience of the world, its substance and endurance. A virtual meditation, ritual, peace-agreement, for example, is good to keep a memory alive and the hope for a new future, but lacks most of its substance in space and endurance in time. It drains also much of the seeing itself: the faster the speed, the more blanks for the eye. The less nourishment for the eye, the greater the craving.

The screen doesn't only drain the eye, but distracts from all the other senses as well. It is through an interplay of moving, touching, tasting, balancing, hearing that a child learns to see and through which vision is maintained and improved throughout life.

The bad news is, that multi-billions are invested in keeping and expanding the dominance of the screen.

The good news: unlike your ears or nose, you can shut your eyes...

Letters to the Editor

Safe Place Homes Inc supports the suggestion from your March correspondent [Ms Evans] that social and affordable housing be dispersed "amongst the community". The ability to do that distribution will of course vary depending on the availability of land, the size and nature of the community and the needs of the prospective residents. Consultation between housing providers and the community is essential to whatever form of housing is being proposed.

In support of the concept of dispersal, we are actively advocating with Hepburn Shire Council for the provision of "inclusionary zoning" within the Planning Scheme - this would require the developer of any major new subdivision to allocate 5-10% of sites for the provision of social and affordable housing.

Following the recent community housing forum, and based on attendees' priorities, Safe Place established several working groups to assist in the investigation of opportunities to provide affordable and appropriate housing throughout the Shire. These include:

 Rentals Working Group - to increase the supply of affordable, long term rental houses in the Shire;

- Small Options Working Group to increase options such as tiny homes, caravans and secondary dwellings;
- Homeshare Working Group to increase available homes via a home-sharing program;
- Land Search Working Group to identify the availability of Council and Crown owned land:
- Youth Housing Working Group to research the needs, preferences and ideas of younger people.

Additionally Safe Place as an organisation will continue to pursue the development of an exemplary Affordable Housing policy and related initiatives for the Shire.

'Some bread for Thaïs and John'

A crowdfunding campaign has raised over \$50,000 for a local family in crisis. John Reid – Castlemaine resident and founder of Trentham's famous RedBeard Historic Bakery – was diagnosed with brain cancer in February, placing enormous stress on his wife Thaïs Sansom and their three sons. A friend's initiative and community generosity has brought some welcome relief.

Joseph Bromley, has worked with Ms Sansom for over a decade. Close friends, they teach performing arts and have collaborated in many community productions and performances. When he heard about Mr Reid's diagnosis, Mr Bromley set up an online GoFundMe campaign titled 'Some bread for Thaïs and John', aiming to raise \$25,000. He started the fundraiser with the hope of covering some of Thaïs' lost income while she stopped work to care for John.



'Thais and John have been immensely generous to our community over many years. I knew their friends and well-wishers would want to give back with some practical support at this difficult time. I'm delighted by the response, which smashed my goal and shows how beloved this family is.'

John co-founded RedBeard with his brother in 2005 to bake authentic sourdough breads and pastries in an historic woodfired oven in the heart of Trentham. The business grew rapidly and now employs over 20 locals. A regional icon and major destination, RedBeard has won several awards for sustainability, a National Baking Industry Award for Excellence and an RACV Tourism Award.

'I'm passionate about ethical and sustainable production of health-giving food,' said Mr Reid. 'We choose RedBeard's suppliers based on their commitment to environmental protection, Indigenous rights, regenerative and ethical farming, and organic food production.'

'John has undergone brain surgery and is recovering at home before starting further treatment to extend his life,' said Ms Sansom. 'We were surprised by Joseph's fundraiser and overwhelmed by the community's response. Having the financial stress lifted means we can focus on spending precious time with family and friends and enjoy sharing happy memories, being in our garden and, of course, eating good food.

'The kind and caring messages people have sent give us emotional strength, which is beyond value. John and I want everyone to know that we feel loved and supported and we are incredibly grateful.

'Meanwhile, we have plans in place to ensure that RedBeard remains in operation and our super staff have been assured that their jobs will continue,' said Ms Sansom. 'We greatly appreciate our community's support of RedBeard over the past 16 years. Every supporter and customer is helping to secure John's wonderful legacy.'

Words in Winter

Bush Poetry

Our town has a long tradition of local poets writing with the regular rhymes and strong rhythms of bush poetry.

One of the earliest was Ben Trewhella, of Trewhella foundry fame. One of the best known was Bruce McKenzie, whose last published collection (The Best of Bruce) appeared shortly before his death in 2018.

It was this long history that prompted the Historical Society to sponsor a Bush Poetry session in Trentham's first Words in Winter Festival in 2004. In the early years, the sessions were organised by Cath Pye and took the form of an Open Mike. Then Gael Elliott took over, and introduced a competition, later with two sections – one for an original poem and another for performance (which was not required to be original, but still could be).

Eventually, there was a wonderful perpetual trophy for Bush Poetry at Words in Winter. This took the form of

a piece of wood from the tree that had stood for many years outside Scala's Blacksmith shop, opposite the railway station (now Trentham Petrol and Stuff). The blacksmiths were in the habit of pitching old horseshoes out the door as they took them off a horse, and a pile of these discarded shoes grew under the tree. One lodged in a fork and was gradually absorbed into the



trunk. It was discovered when the tree was removed. The piece of trunk was cut and polished with horseshoe still prominent and became the Bruce McKenzie Bush Poetry Perpetual Trophy, now in the safe keeping of the Trentham Library.

In 2019, the competition was replaced by a tribute dinner to Bruce McKenzie. 2020 was the first year of Words in Winter without any Bush Poetry. In 2021, we revive the session. However, instead of a competition, we will have a retrospective session, presenting the work of local poets from Ben Trewhella to the present, as well as some of the winners from former years. The second half of the

programme will be an Open Mike session – all bush poets invited to participate.



There will always be local poets in Trentham, but it is possible that this traditional outlet for their work may not survive past 2021. If you have the time and the interest, please consider volunteering to be part of the organising team.



Making the most of our Autumnal weather, this month Digby & Niles are off to Lump o Dough.

Charming in the gorgeous evening light, the pergola has been extended over the rustic courtyard to provide protection from Trentham's temperamental weather. Diners are cosy under the recently installed overhead heaters. The black structure is softened by grape vines and Niles looks forward to what might be made from those one day!

Decisions are easy at Lump o Dough. The pizza list is short and sharp –all of them delicious. The diverse and creative toppings and crust perfection attract pizza lovers from all over Victoria. The drinks menu punches above its weight with easy drinking but interesting wines thoughtfully selected for pizza matching. For warmer nights there are beers, San Pellegrino soft drinks (focusing on flavour rather than sugar!) and staying with the Italian theme: Aperol Spritz to start with!

Despite all that Italian goodness, Niles & Digby started as they always do, with the French Rosé! The Famille Perrin Reserve Côtes du Rhône Rosé 2018. So very drinkable, with sweet-tart berry flavours and crisp dry minerally tone. A delicate grapefruit pink colour, it's full bodied and silky and a pleasure to drink. It's perfect as a predinner drink but also big enough to stand up to pizza (including, Digby shudders, where a pizza crime has been committed – adding

pineapple) Niles paired it with the fabulous local potato pizza, which includes rosemary grown onsite.

Now while Niles is an avid fan of the Trentham inspired potato and rosemary pizza, the lion in Digby cannot go past the carnivore with its fiery spread of meats and chillies. When the carnivore arrived, it was time to bring out the big guns - the Langmeil 2018 Prime Cut Shiraz.

Although Lump o Dough might be the newest of Trentham's dining establishments, the Langmeil Shiraz comes from one of Barossa Valley's oldest families – 6 generations committed to wine excellence. A fine red in the modern style – with depth but not too heavy. A deep crimson colour with a spicy ripe plum aroma. A juicy fruity wine, with just enough tannins to provide a peppery edge and round out the structure. The sort of red that demands a second bottle and Digby – bless his heart – would have had a third.

A fine night was had at Lump o Dough: good food, good wine, good company.

Oh, look Niles - the Cosmo is still open...

Trentham Friends of Bees

Busy Bees

Have you noticed bees are now sounding a little cranky? Buzzing around with purpose from flower to flower, rather than the relaxed meander of summertime. Happily, they are not trying to sting us (or worse, keep us away from our gardens!), they are just busy bees on a mission.



Autumn is an important time for honeybees and native bees as they prepare for winter. As the days shorten bees know it's time to go into food-gathering mode for preservation – their colonies may not survive if they don't make adequate preparations. Worker bees work longer and harder to collect enough nectar to feed and maintain the colony throughout winter. When the cold sets in, and flowers start to disappear, their job becomes more challenging and the bees more determined.

In autumn, the new worker bees are slightly different from the summer bees because their fat-producing gene is switched on so they put all the weight on they can to stay warm. Autumn born bees can live for up to six months, while bees born during spring and summer live for just six weeks as they work so hard collecting nectar and pollen.

So, how can we help our friends before they are coo...ped up indoors for the long winter? As we know, bees rely on pollen and nectar to make honey and sustain their colony.

It hasn't been a great season (what summer?!) and the bees need all the help they can get. So please:

- Keep out of their way!
- Leave any flowering plants growing for long as you can, particularly anything with yellow and blue flowers.
- Don't weed! Flowering weeds especially yellow flowers – are great for bees.

Did you know?

Autumn is when Worker Bees kick Drone Bees to the curb (literally, out of the hive) to fend for themselves as their job is done when the Queen Bee goes into hibernation.



Trentham wins Two Bowls Premierships!!



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
